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## CHAPTER 1

### **Mission and Goals of the AFJROTC Program**

1. The mission of the Air Force Junior Reserve Officers Training Corps (AFJROTC) is:

**Develop citizens of character dedicated to serving our nation and communities.**

2. The mission statement of the AFJROTC program at the Academy for Academic Excellence is:

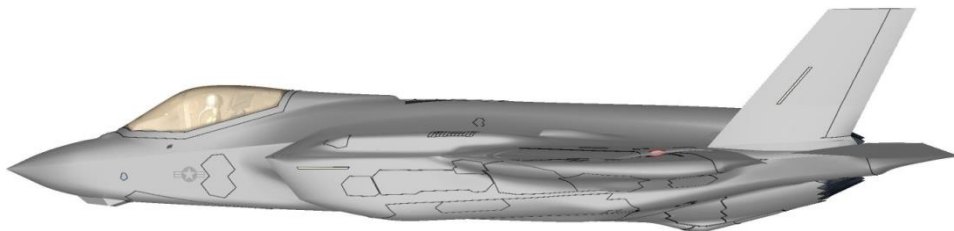
**To excel in knowledge,

3. The goals of the AFJROTC program are to instill in high school cadets:

- a. Values of Citizenship**
- b. Service to the United States**
- c. Personal Responsibility**
- d. Sense of Accomplishment**

4. The CA-20068 Cadet Group Goal is:

**No failing grade for any cadet in any class.**



### **F-35 Lightning II**

The F-35 is a fifth generation, supersonic stealth fighter designed to replace a wide range of existing aircraft, including the AV-8 Harrier, A-10 Thunderbolt II, F-16 Fighting Falcon, F/A-18 Hornet and British Harriers (some versions will be vertical takeoff and landing capable). All versions will have a single large flat touch screen display for an instrument panel and a helmet mounted display for the pilot. Because over 1600 aircraft are planned to be built, current AFJROTC cadets who go on to become military pilots have a good chance of flying the F-35.

## CHAPTER 2

### Standards

1. The Cadet Honor Code is:

**“I will not lie, cheat, or steal, nor condone those who do.”**

These simple words provide the basis for a personal code of honesty that will sustain you for the rest of your life. The Honor Code is specific and clear in what it demands. Maintaining a high standard of trustworthiness is your responsibility. This requires self-control and a conscious effort at all times. It should become your ethical code and life-style. This is the same honor code used by the USAF Academy.

2. Core values are those ideals that form the basis for our entire cadet training. They define who we are as members of AFJROTC. They are not negotiable; they do not change with the circumstances. They are the motivations for all our actions.

#### **INTEGRITY FIRST**

*An unfaltering devotion to honesty, truthfulness, doing one's duty and what is right.*

#### **SERVICE BEFORE SELF**

*Subordinate our personal interests, attitudes and aspirations to the greater cause and the demands it places on us.*

#### **EXCELLENCE IN ALL WE DO**

*Continuous improvement and innovation. The standard you should set for yourself.*

3. Standards of Conduct. As explained and described in your Leadership Education textbooks and Cadet Corps Operating Instructions, you will learn to become a leader by setting the example. You will be taught to inspire others by your intelligent decisions, good judgment, decisiveness, and initiative. In order to realize your highest potential you must maintain high personal standards of self-discipline, high ideals, good manners, social grace, appropriate dress (in and out of uniform), and good grooming.

## CHAPTER 3

### The Cadet Corps

1. The unit designator for the AFJROTC program at the Academy for Academic Excellence is: **CA-20068 (California 20068<sup>th</sup> Cadet Group)**
2. Organization of the Cadet Corps. Each class period is designated as a "Flight" and assigned an alpha designator in sequence (1<sup>st</sup> period is "A" Flight, second period is "B" Flight, and so on). Each row of chairs/desks within the classroom is designated as an "Element" and numbered in sequence (the 1<sup>st</sup> row is "1<sup>st</sup> Element", second row is "2<sup>nd</sup> Element", and so on).
3. The command structure of CA-20068 is similar to that shown in Table 1-2 on page 7 of your Leadership Education 100 textbook. The AFJROTC unit at the Academy for Academic Excellence is organized as a Cadet Group. Cadet job descriptions are listed in the AFJROTC Operating Instructions.



### **F-16 Fighting Falcon**

The F-16 is compact, multirole fighter aircraft. It is highly maneuverable and has proven itself in air-to-air combat and air-to-surface attack. It provides a relatively low cost, high performance weapon system for the United States and Allied Nations. It is being replaced by the F-35 Lightning II.

## CHAPTER 4

### **Membership, Transfer, and Withdrawal of Students**

1. To be eligible for membership in the AFJROTC program, each cadet must meet the following minimum requirements:

- a. Enroll in, and attend, a regular course of AFJROTC instruction
- b. Be a citizen of the United States\*
- c. Be at least 14 years of age upon completion of the first year of instruction
- d. Demonstrate good moral character
- e. Be capable of participating in the school's standard physical education program. Physically challenged students require the concurrence of the Senior Aerospace Science Instructor (SASI) and the principal.

\* Non-citizens will be handled in accordance with AFJROTC Instructions.

2. Transfer students from other high school Junior ROTC programs may be granted credit for training already completed. The SASI will determine appropriate rank and class placement.

3. Cadets may be removed from the AFJROTC program by the SASI for repeated violations of cadet corps standards.



**F-22 Raptor**

The F-22 is the USAF's newest operational fighter aircraft. Its combination of stealth, super cruise, maneuverability and integrated avionics coupled with improved supportability, represents an exponential leap in war fighting capabilities.

## CHAPTER 5

### Attendance and Grading

1. **Grading Policy:** A cadet's overall grade is a combination of scores received in Aerospace Science (AS) and the Science of Leadership Education (LE) academic classes, as well as scores received on weekly uniform inspections. Letter grades will be determined using the following scale:

<u>Letter Grade</u>	<u>Grade Percent</u>	<u>Level of Progress</u>
A	90-100	Excellent
B	80-89	Good
C	70-79	Satisfactory
F	0-69	Failing
I	N/A	Incomplete

In support of the cadet group goal, cadets with a letter grade of "C-" or lower will be counseled, placed on probation and/or monitored closely for removal from the program. Cadets who fail to meet the minimum attendance requirements will be given a grade of "I", which will convert to a failing grade if the required days are not made up or waived within two weeks of the end of the grading period. The SASI will remove cadets who receive a semester grade of "F" (failing) *in any class*.

2. **Attendance Policy:** Physical attendance in class is essential to learning. Since a large amount of the AFJROTC instruction is either lecture or "hands-on" training, good attendance is critically important. Unexcused absences will negatively impact a cadet's grade starting with the 3<sup>rd</sup> unexcused absence during any semester, and amount to a 1% reduction in the final grade for each unexcused absence.

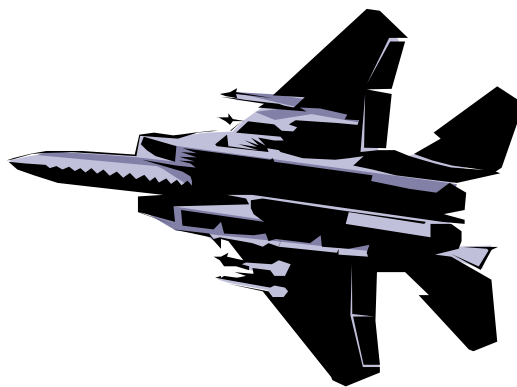
## CHAPTER 6

### Classroom Conduct and Military Courtesy

1. While in the AFJROTC classroom, cadets will conduct themselves with full military courtesy. Each class period will begin with cadets at the position of parade rest (refer to AFJROTC Operating Instruction No. 1, Class Management Procedures). The use of proper military titles is encouraged each day, and required on uniform days. Hands will be raised when you want to speak. The classroom will be left clean and orderly. Professionalism at all times is the key to success!

2. Because you wear the official uniform of the United States Air Force, the rules that guide your conduct are unique. Your actions in public, especially while in uniform, can create both good and bad impressions. You may be surprised to learn that many people, seeing you in uniform, will think that you are on active duty. This fact, among others, is why all cadets must display proper conduct and behavior at all times. A few general rules to follow include:

- a. Always look your best in uniform. Your appearance will speak much louder than your words.
- b. Abide by the Cadet Honor Code.
- c. Be loyal to the cadet corps. If you have a disagreement, use your cadet chain of command.
- d. While in uniform, always address cadets by the proper military title - - no first names!
- e. As an AFJROTC cadet you will be held to a higher set of standards by others. Together we can all meet this challenge!



**F-15 Eagle**

## CHAPTER 7

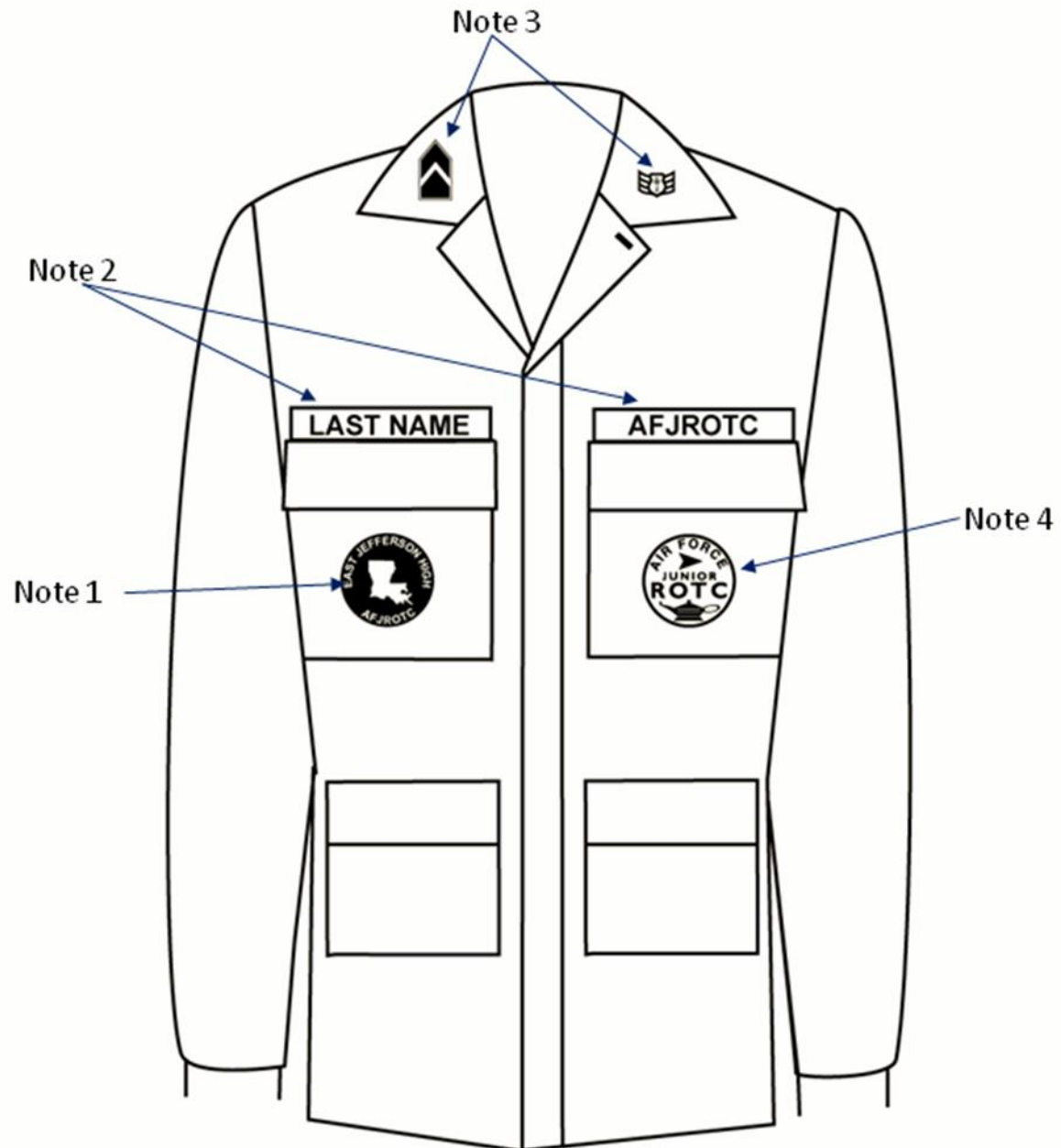
### Uniforms and Personal Appearance

1. Each cadet will be issued a service (blue) uniform. Cadets who successfully complete leadership camp will be issued a Battle Dress Uniform (BDU). Senior cadets will be issued flight suits. These are the same uniforms worn by the active duty members of the United States Air Force. While wearing it, you become a part of a proud tradition. As with any organization, wearing the uniform is an important part of membership. It shows pride in your unit and yourself, as well as a sense of loyalty to your fellow cadets.
2. Your uniform, along with all required insignia, will be issued to you free of charge. These items are the property of the United States Air Force and your high school. You will be held **100%** responsible for its proper wear and upkeep. Uniform items that require replacement will be done so at the cadet's expense.
3. You will be required to wear the uniform one full academic day each week. On this "uniform day" you will be inspected, and this inspection will be graded on a 100 point scale. Failure to wear the uniform will result in a grade of "F" for that assignment. Failure to wear the uniform (known as a MUD - Missed Uniform Day) for unexcused reasons 3 times within a semester is grounds for removal from the program.
4. The next few pages outline some general guidelines for wear of the AFJROTC uniform. More specific guidance is covered in your Leadership Education 100 textbook.

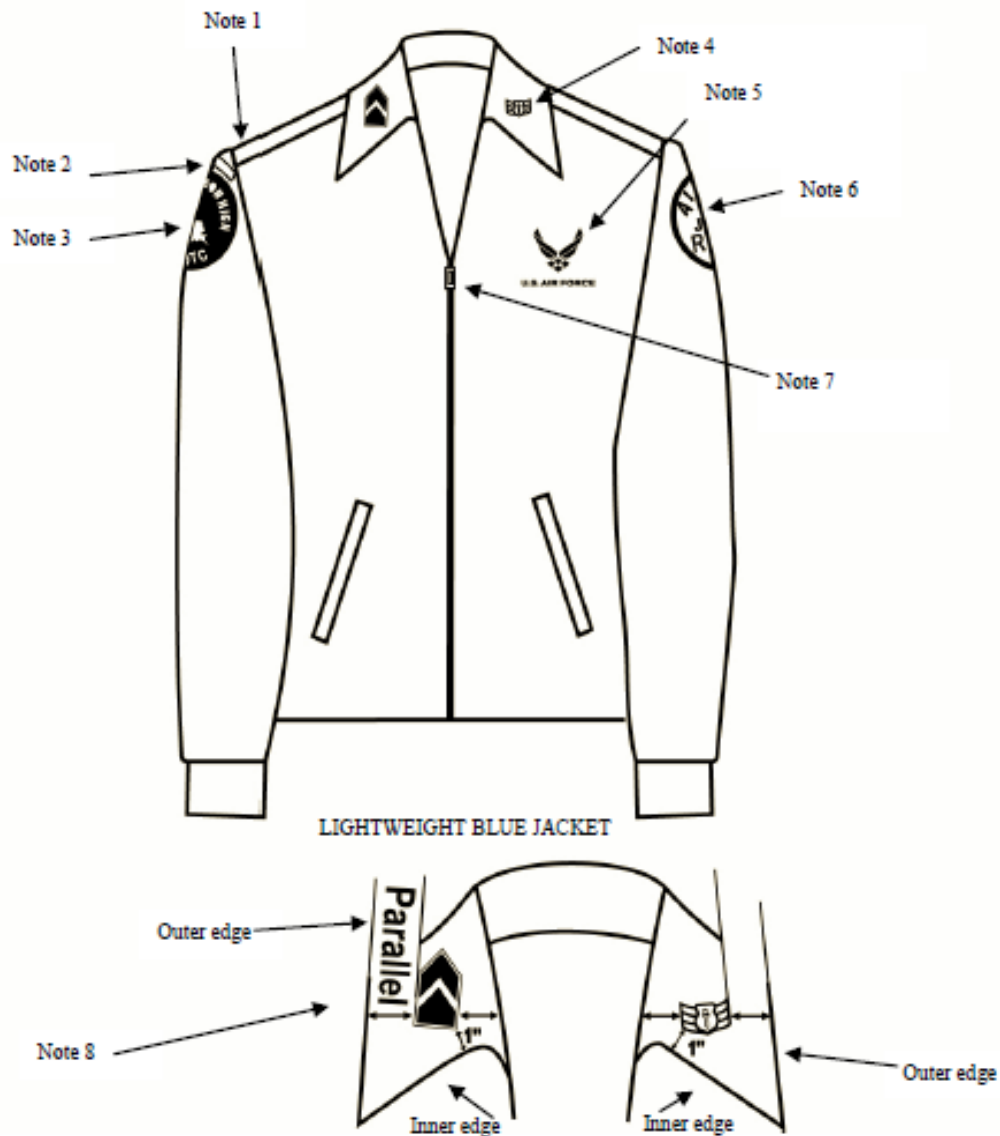


## CADET BATTLE DRESS UNIFORM (BDU) Male and Female



1. Unit patch worn on right pocket and centered.
2. Tapes grounded and centered on pockets.
3. Grade insignia (officer or enlisted) is worn on both left and right collars, centered on collar and parallel with bottom of collar. Airman Basic has no collar insignia.
4. AFJROTC patch worn on left pocket and centered.

# CADET LIGHTWEIGHT BLUE JACKET

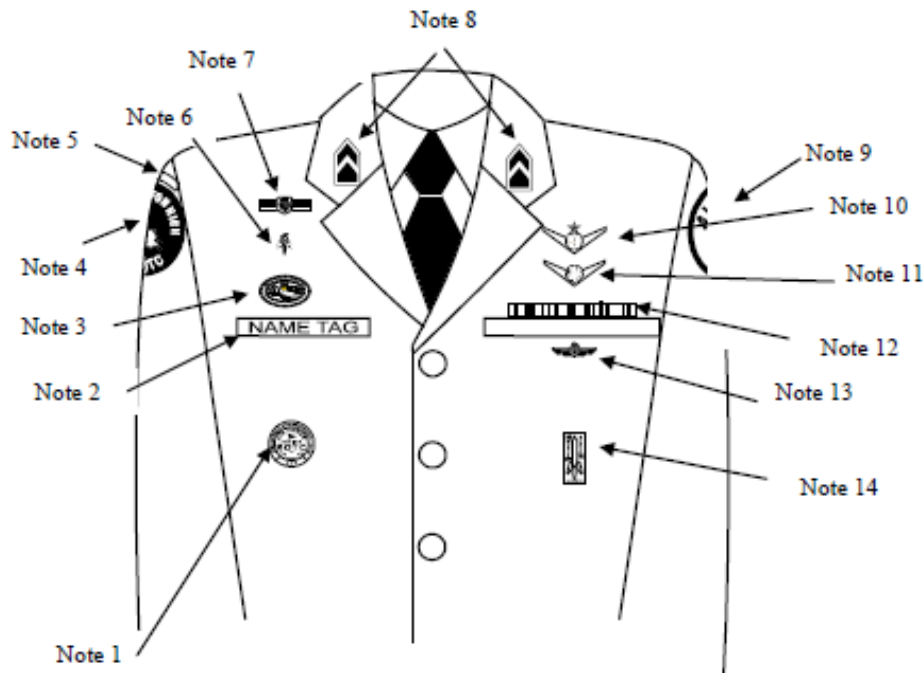


LIGHTWEIGHT BLUE JACKET

1. (Officers only) When placing rank on epaulet instead of collar, use standard size metal rank, center on epaulet 5/8 in from shoulder seam.
2. Shoulder tabs are centered between unit patch and shoulder seam. If no patch, then 1" below shoulder seam.
3. Unit patch on right sleeve 1/2 to 1 inch below shoulder seam and centered.
4. Grade insignia (officer and enlisted) is worn on both left and right collar. Airman Basic have no collar insignia.
5. Optional item: center vertically between the shoulder seam and where the underarm side seam joins the armhole sleeve and center horizontally between the center zipper and the sleeve armhole seam.
6. AFJROTC patch on left sleeve 1/2 to 1 inch below shoulder seam and centered.
7. Jacket will be closed to at least the halfway point.
8. Center insignia horizontally on collar. Place 1 inch from bottom of collar and parallel to the outer edge of the collar.

## CADET MALE 1620 SERVICE DRESS

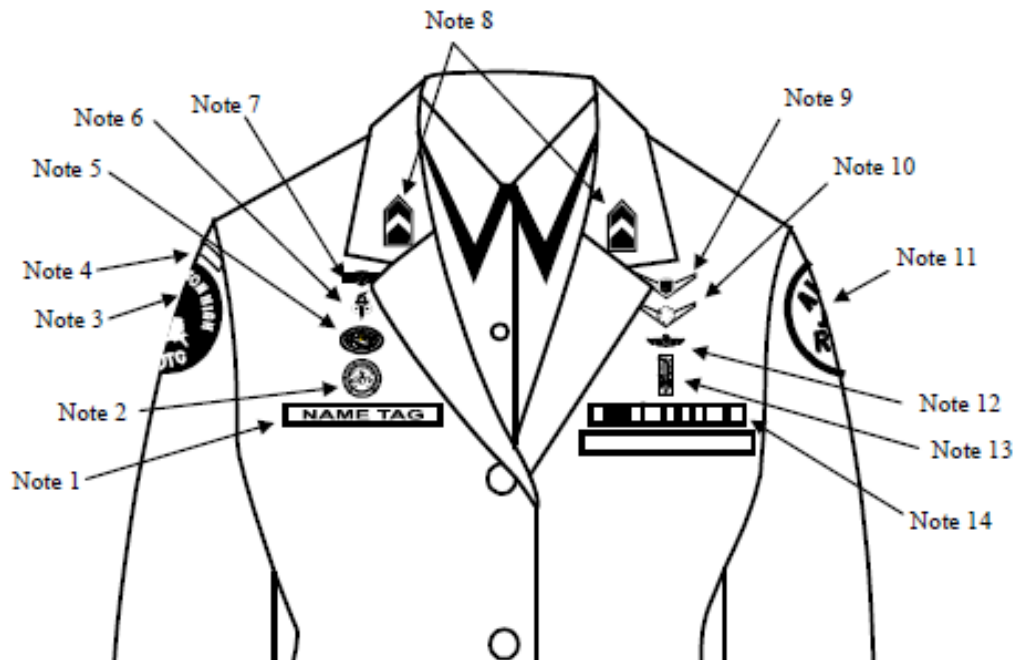
Note: Cadets may wear the rank on both coat and shirt at the same time or only on the coat. The cadets must be in proper uniform at all times. If they have the coat on, the rank insignia must be on the coat. If they remove the coat, the rank must be on the shirt.



1. Awareness Presentation Team (APT) badge: Center on welt pocket 3 inches below the top.
2. Name tag: Center between arm seam and lapel with bottom edge parallel to top of welt pocket
3. Kitty Hawk Badge: see note 15.
4. Unit patch: Placed  $\frac{1}{2}$  to 1 inch below shoulder seam and centered.
5. Shoulder tabs: Center between unit patch and shoulder seam. If no patch, then 1 inch below shoulder seam.
6. Aerospace Education Foundation (AEF) Badge: see note 15.
7. Distinguished Cadet Badge: see note 15.
8. Grade insignia (officer or enlisted) worn on both lapels. Place insignia halfway up the seam, resting on but not over it. Bottom of insignia is horizontal with the ground. \*(The lapel insignia (eagles non-chrome) will no longer be worn on the lapels by Airmen Basics.)
9. AFJROTC Patch: Placed  $\frac{1}{2}$  to 1 inch below shoulder seam, and centered.
10. Flight Solo or Flight Certificate Badge: see note 15.
11. Ground School Badge: see note 15.
12. Ribbons: Center, on but not over edge of pocket. Wear 3 or 4 in a row. Wear all or some.
13. Academy of Model Aeronautic Wings: worn 1 inch below pocket.
14. Model Rocketry Badge: worn 2 inches below AMA Wings or 3 inches below pocket if no AMA Wings are worn.
15. First badge placed  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch above name tag or ribbons and is centered horizontally. Additional badges placed  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch above previous badge.

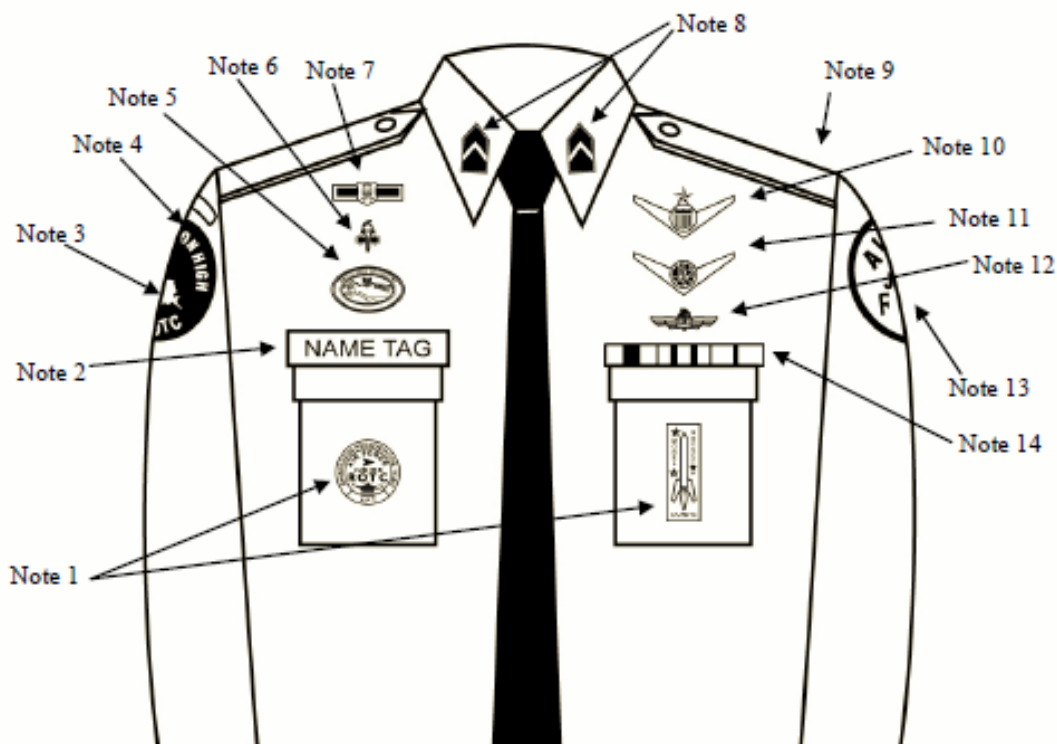
# CADET FEMALE 1620 SERVICE DRESS

Note: Cadets may wear the rank on both coat and shirt at the same time or only on the coat. The cadets must be in proper uniform at all times. If they have the coat on, the rank insignia must be on the coat. If they remove the coat, the rank must be on the shirt.



1. Name tag: authorized for wear and is to be centered on right side, even with to 1 1/2 inches higher or lower than the first exposed button.
2. Awareness Presentation Team Badge: see note 15.
3. Unit patch: center 1/2 to 1 inch below shoulder seam.
4. Shoulder tab: centered between unit patch and shoulder seam. If no patch, then 1 inch below shoulder seam.
5. Kitty Hawk Badge: see note 15.
6. Aerospace Education Foundation (AEF) Badge: see note 15.
7. Distinguished Cadet Badge: see note 15.
8. Grade insignia (officer or enlisted) worn on both lapels. Place insignia halfway up the seam, resting on but not over it. Bottom of insignia is horizontal with the ground. \*(The lapel insignia (eagles non-chrome) will no longer be worn on the lapels by Airmen Basics.)
9. Flight Solo or Flight Certificate Badge: see note 15.
10. Ground School Badge: see note 15.
11. AFJROTC Patch: center 1/2 to 1 inch below shoulder seam.
12. Academy of Model Aeronautic (AMA) Wings: see note 15.
13. Model Rocketry Badge: see note 15.

15. First badge placed 1/2 inch above name tag or ribbons (whichever is appropriate) and is centered horizontally. Additional badges placed 1/2 inch above previous badge.

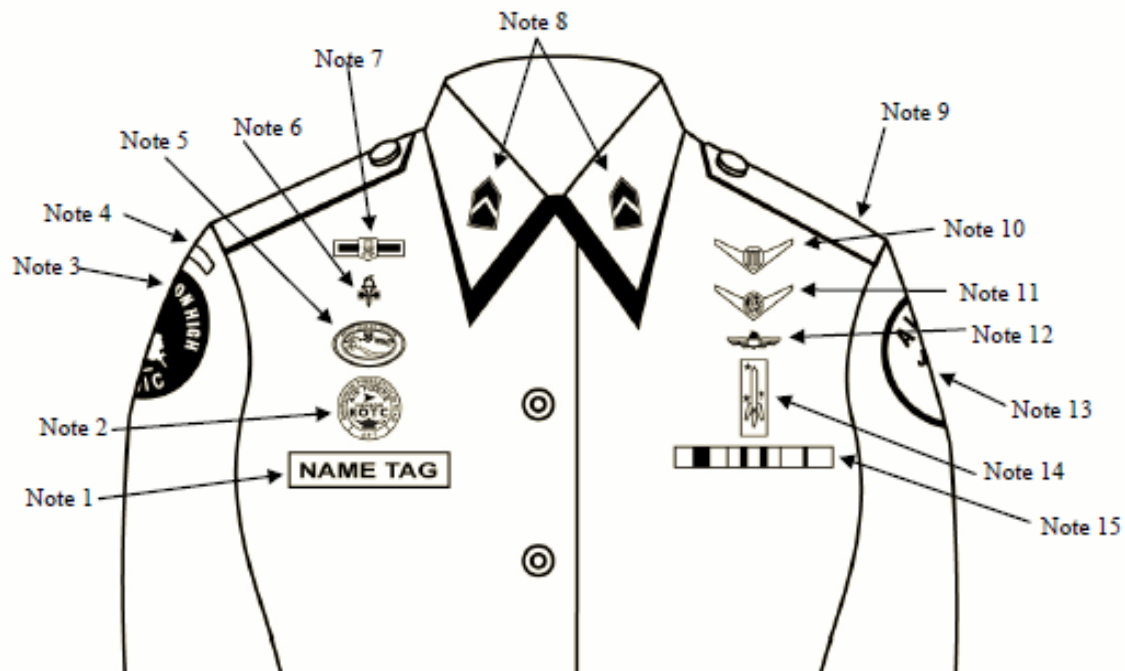
# CADET MALE BLUE SHIRT



1. Awareness Presentation Team (APT) and Model Rocketry Badge are centered on the pockets on the appropriate sides as displayed above.
2. Name tag: authorized for wear and is to be grounded and centered over wearer's right pocket.
3. Unit patch: center  $\frac{1}{2}$  to 1 inch below shoulder seam.
4. Shoulder tab: center between unit patch and shoulder seam. If no patch, then place 1 inch below shoulder seam.
5. Kitty Hawk Badge: see note 15.
6. Aerospace Education Foundation (AEF) Badge: see note 15.
7. Distinguished Cadet Badge: see note 15.
8. Grade insignia (officer or enlisted) worn on both left and right collar, centered side to side and top to bottom. Enlisted rank's bottom point of torch points toward the point of the collar. Officer top point of rank aligned with point of collar. Airman Basic have no insignia of any kind on the collar.
9. (Officers only) When using officer cloth rank on epaulets versus miniature metal rank on collar, place as close as possible to shoulder seam.
10. Flight Solo or Flight Certificate Badge: see note 15.
11. Ground School Badge: see note 15.
12. Academy of Model Aeronautic (AMA) Wings: see note 15.
13. AFJROTC Patch: center  $\frac{1}{2}$  to 1 inch below shoulder seam.
14. Ribbons: ground and center on pocket.
15. First badge placed  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch above name tag or ribbons and is centered horizontally. Additional badges placed  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch above previous badge.



# CADET FEMALE BLUE SHIRT



1. Name tag: authorized for wear and is to be centered on right side, even with to 1 1/2 inches higher or lower than the first exposed button.
2. Awareness Presentation Team Badge: see note 16.
3. Unit patch: center 1/2 to 1 inch below shoulder seam.
4. Shoulder tab: centered between unit patch and shoulder seam. If no patch, then 1 inch below shoulder seam.
5. Kitty Hawk Badge: see note 16.
6. Aerospace Education Foundation (AEF) Badge: see note 16.
7. Distinguished Cadet Badge: see note 16.
8. Grade insignia (officer or enlisted) worn on both left and right collar, centered side to side and top to bottom. Enlisted rank's bottom point of torch points toward the point of the collar. Officer top point of rank aligned with point of collar. Airman Basic have no insignia of any kind on the collar.
9. (Officers only) When using officer cloth rank on epaulets versus miniature metal rank on collar, place as close as possible to shoulder seam.
10. Flight Solo or Flight Certificate Badge: see note 16.
11. Ground School Badge: see note 16.
12. Academy of Model Aeronautic (AMA) Wings: see note 16.
13. AFJROTC Patch: center 1/2 to 1 inch below shoulder seam.
14. Model Rocketry Badge: see note 16.
15. Ribbons: Center, parallel with ground. Align with bottom of name tag. Or, if no name tag, align bottom of ribbons even with to 1 1/2 inches higher or lower than the first exposed button.
16. First badge placed 1/2 inch above name tag or ribbons (whichever is appropriate) and is centered horizontally. Additional badges placed 1/2 inch above previous badge.

## CHAPTER 8

### Co-Curricular Activities

1. Each cadet is encouraged to participate in as many co-curricular activities as their personal schedule permits. Since these activities are all related to aerospace and/or your leadership training, cadets who participate are more likely to be promoted and assume higher leadership positions.
2. The following co-curricular activities may be offered (dependent on scheduling and time availability):
  - a. **Color Guard.** This elite group has the honor of presenting and posting the national, state, USAF, and school colors (flags) at important school and community events. The Color Guard may also compete at drill competitions.
  - b. **Drill Teams.** This co-curricular activity is offered as a regular class. The drill teams include Armed (with rifles) and Unarmed (without rifles) teams. They demonstrate their skill and creativity at performances and competitions throughout the school year. A great deal of time outside the classroom is required to become a regular member of this group, but the honor more than compensates for the time.
  - c. **Aerospace Modeling Class.** If you like building model rockets, static model aircraft, radio controlled aircraft, then this class is for you!
  - e. **Recruiting Team.** The AFJROTC program must continually grow to succeed. The recruiting team is our public voice at community events, school open houses, and middle school visits. Looking sharp in uniform and good public speaking skills are a must for this team.
  - f. **Kitty Hawk Air Society.** This group is an academic honors club, much like the National Honor Society. Promoting academic and personal excellence are the goals of this group. Membership requires a grade of "A" in AFJROTC, and a 3.0 GPA in all other classes.
  - g. **Cyber Patriot Team.** *Cyber Patriot* inspires high school students toward careers in cyber security or other science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) disciplines.
  - h. **Academic Team.** Participates in JROTC Academic Bowls to demonstrate the academic strength of the AFJROTC program, improve test scores, increase interest in college attendance, promote teamwork and boost cadet corps spirit.
  - i. **Marksmanship Team.** This team competes in three position air rifle shooting.
3. Community service projects are a very important part of the AFJROTC experience. Supporting our school and local community through selfless acts is what helps each of us become better citizens. Community service earns you respect as you live the core value of "service before self."

## CHAPTER 9

### Extra-curricular Activities

1. The AFJROTC program encourages each unit to hold five extra-curricular activities each academic year. These are:

a. **Dining In.** A formal military dinner involving only the members of the AFJROTC unit. The tradition of the Dining In reaches farther back than the history of the United States Air Force itself. It is designed to provide a learning environment where members of the cadet corps bond together while having fun.

b. **Pass In Review.** An old fashioned military parade. Born out of the tradition of a commander reviewing their "troops", this activity allows the cadets an opportunity to show off their marching and organizational skills. Normally conducted on a full parade field, with colors flying and music playing, it's an event for cadets and their families to remember.

c. **Military Ball.** Often referred to as an AFJROTC "Prom", this evening of social graces and military courtesies is a highlight for most cadets. Complete with a formal receiving line, dance music, and good food, it's a time you won't want to miss.

d. **Annual Awards Ceremony.** At the end of each school year we take time to recognize and reward cadets for their hard work and dedication. Families and friends are encouraged to attend.

e. **Leadership Camp.** This is an optional extracurricular program that teaches AFJROTC cadets aspects of citizenship and leadership in a highly structured and focused instructional environment. The mission is to provide this development by preparing cadets for leadership positions in their units, schools and local communities.

2. Each of these events is held outside of school hours.



**MQ-1 Predator**

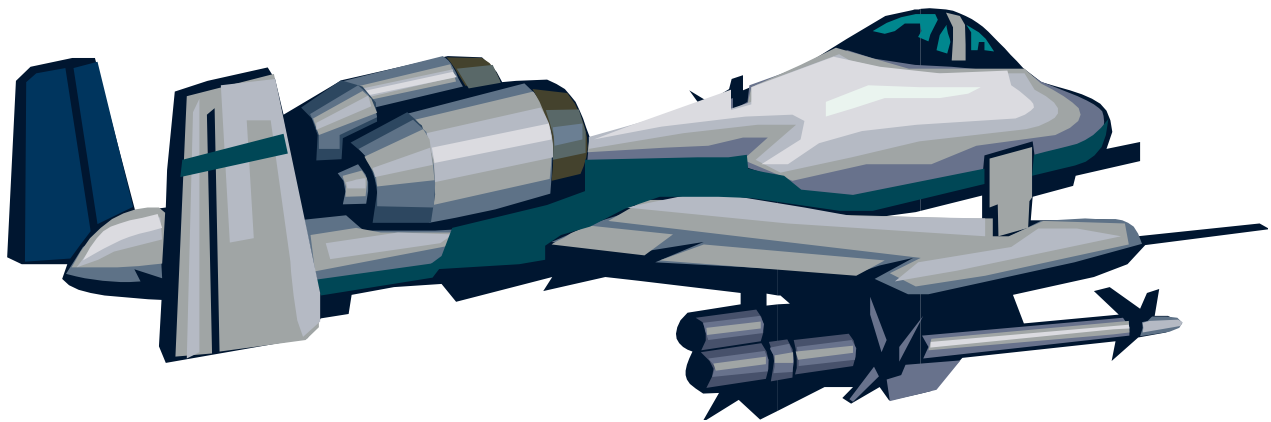
The MQ-1 is a medium altitude, long range remotely piloted aircraft (RPA). Its primary mission is interdiction and armed reconnaissance against critical, perishable targets.

## CHAPTER 10

### AFJROTC Program Completion

1. Cadets who successfully\* complete two academic years of AFJROTC will be awarded the Certificate of Training. One semester of college-level ROTC credit may be granted based on this certificate. Each military service may grant advanced promotion upon regular enlistment based on this certificate.
2. Cadets who successfully\* complete three academic years of AFJROTC will be awarded the Certificate of Completion. One semester of college-level ROTC credit may be granted based on this certificate. Each military service grants special promotion consideration upon regular enlistment based on this certificate.
3. All services academies aggressively seek cadets who have completed the AFJROTC program. In fact, AFJROTC cadets are selected for service academies at a rate of 95% (compared to high school students applying that have not completed the program). Colleges and Universities who host Senior ROTC program also seek AFJROTC cadets, offering scholarships up to, and including, full-ride scholarships.

\* Successful completion of the AFJROTC program is based on a passing grade of "C" or higher for each semester enrolled. A grade of "D" is not normally given and will require special allowance by the SASI. Any semester with a final grade of "F" will not be counted towards award of any certificate.



**A-10 Thunderbolt II**

The A-10 is the first USAF aircraft specially designed for close air support of ground forces. They are simple, effective and survivable twin-engine jet aircraft that can be used against all ground targets, including tanks and other armored vehicles.

## CHAPTER 11

### Promotions and Awards

1. Promotions within AFJROTC are earned through active participation. Rank insignia represents position and responsibility. It is a visible sign of growth in maturity, ability, willingness to accept additional responsibility, and leadership qualities. However, you will not be promoted simply because you are a member of the cadet corps.

2. There are two types of rank a cadet may hold, they are:

a. Permanent Rank. Enlisted rank is earned through successful completion of each AFJROTC course of study, and demonstrated leadership ability. Permanent officer rank is earned by holding a leadership position for two consecutive semesters, and at the concurrence of the SASI. This rank is carried over through each semester.

b. Temporary Rank. Rank (officer or enlisted) worn while a cadet holds a particular leadership position. See AFJROTC Operating Instruction No. 13 for more specific information.

3. All promotions may be lost through demotions based on poor academic/job performance or misconduct. The SASI will be the final authority for all demotions.

## CHAPTER 12

### Cadet Performance Reports

1. Four times each academic year, cadets will receive an individualized performance report prepared by a member of the cadet leadership. These reports will provide each member of the cadet corps with useful information on their progress in areas such as classroom participation, writing and speaking skills, appearance in uniform and leadership ability. These reports **will not** affect your academic grade. They will be used to determine your fitness for promotion, cadet leadership position and awards.
2. All reports will be filed in your cadet personnel record, and are available for your review. See AFJROTC Operating Instruction No. 4 for more specific information.
